

After six months of work sand blasting and painting components of the Estate 249 caboose stove, assembly was finally completed on 7 September 2022 by Bill Lugg in his shop. The stove was placed in the wood caboose by John Emmot and Bill Lugg on 10 September. All it needs now is the chimney work completed.



On 30 August 2022, the RMRHS received a second delivery of 47 tons of ballast from Rock and Rail as a most generous donation. it was deposited at the east end of the newly graded roadbed. Our thanks to Mark Furstenberger of Classic Homes for help in arranging its transport from Parkdale to Calhan.

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


Bill Lugg and Greg Roberts try to figure out how to remove the signal lights for refurbishing.


Caboose Stove

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Ghostly Trains and Haunted Rails: Along the Denver, South Park & Pacific Line

A ghostly sighting is attributed along the rails of the Denver, South Park and Pacific Railroad, which ran from Denver along the South Platte River and into Waterton Canyon, then over Kenosha Pass and through South Park and eventually ended in Gunnison. The Gunnison segment was abandoned in 1927, with the Denver, Kenosha part abandoned in 1939.

But in the 1890's, William Westwal, an engineer on the line in the 1880's told the following story to a reporter for the Rocky Mountain News.

A man named Ike Taylor lived with his wife and three children in a small cabin in the small town of Webster. Ike got into a fight with a man from Como named Steve Smith. Apparently the fight was so terrible that Smith declared he would kill Turner, and burn his cabin down. One day when Ike Turner was in Breckinridge, Steve Smith did just that. He burned Ike Turner's Cabin down, killing Ike's wife and three children in the fire.

Smith fled down Platte Canyon with Turner hard on his trail, eventually finding the villain Smith. Both men fought. Sadly Turner's body was found by a pursuing posse in a gulch, broken as if it had been thrown there and stabbed numerous times. Eventually Smith was found and hung after a miner's court rendered him a murderer. His body was left to feed crows and rot.

Now these doings happened before the railroad laid track, but the engineer told of an evening as he slowly drove his train through Platte Canyon at Dome Rock, and he and his fireman saw what looked like a man throwing himself off the rocks onto the tracks below. A few nights later in the exact same area, the same men saw more of a scene, two men fighting upon the rock, one stabbing the other and throwing him off the rock.

The engineer told that he ran that route, and every time he did, he saw the same battle enacted on Dome Rock and knew it was a ghost scene.

Another time, Westwal and his fireman saw a cabin burning near Webster, as they brought their train near the top of Kenosha Pass, heading towards Denver. As they passed the burning cabin they could hear screams from a woman and children, but when they asked in Denver the next morning, they were told that not only was there no fire, there hadn't been a cabin on that location for a very long time.

Searchlight Road Signal

It's a vanishing relic from when railroad movements were controlled by signal lights. These very possibly are relics from the D&SL railroad which was acquired by the D&RGW.


A BN steel caboose used in a BNSF transfer to the UP. April 5th, 2022. Denver, Colorado.




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
